


About Norma Kassirer

Norma Kassirer, writer and artist, is best known for her two novels for children, *Magic Elizabeth* (The Viking Press, 1966) and *The Doll Snatchers* (The Viking Press, 1969). *Magic Elizabeth* has been called a modern classic, and has been reprinted many times, currently appearing in newspapers throughout the world through Breakfast Serials serialized stories.

Subsequent publications include *The Hidden Wife*, a collection of stories with artwork by Willyum Rowe (Shuffaloff Press, 1991), the story cycle *Milly* (Buffalo Ochre Papers, 2008), and her novella *Katzenjammered* (BlazeVOX Books, 2010). Her short fiction and poetry have been published in various magazines, including *Angle of Repose*, *Between C & D*, *Blatant Artifice*, *MSS*, *Son's Ear*, *TEXTS*, *Yellow Field*, and elsewhere. Her poems, which tend toward the narrative, often cross expectations of genre and engage with the lyric.


Also a painter, Norma exhibited her paintings at Betty's Restaurant on Virginia Street and at the Western New York Book Arts Collaborative for the book release of *Katzenjammered*. She also made stunning and thoroughly original handmade artist's books, one of which is owned by the Albright-Knox Art Gallery. Norma often painted at the MollyOlga studio, and participated in teaching classes there and through the Poets in the Schools program. She and her husband Earle were long involved with Hallwalls from its inception, with Norma at one time having painted murals on the ceiling of the old space on Essex.

Between the selection of these poems for inclusion in the Poetry Collection's Three Poems series and their publication, the author passed away at 89. May these poems mark her passing, and her longstanding contributions to the cultural life of the Buffalo community.
